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A: Horus-Harpocrates sitting to right on lotus with one leg bent in knee, holding flail in his right hand. His left hand raised to his mouth. On his head a solar disc with three rays. Two buds on the lotus flower. Baseline to indicate primeval mound?

B: Inscribed in four lines: $\alpha\beta\lambda\alpha\nu|\alpha\theta\alpha\nu\alpha\lambda|\beta\alpha\sigma\varepsilon\sigma\varepsilon\nu|\gamma\varepsilon\nu\beta\alpha\rho$ \rightarrow Åβλαναθαναλβα-palindrome, part of σεσεγγενβαρφαραγγης.

A praxis known from a papyrus (PGM LXI 1-38) specifies that love charms had to be incised with the image of Horus on a lotus flower and the magical name Abraxas. Pieces with the Horus-scheme used as love charms: CBd-533, CBd-534.
