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A: Harpocrates sitting to right on a lotus with knees drawn up; under the flower three lotus stalks with buds. Horus' left hand raised to his mouth, his right holds a flail. On the top of his head a crown? On the left of the figure: $\alpha \iota o \nu \rightarrow \alpha \iota \acute{\omega} \nu$. 'Eternity'. On the right of the figure, with deeper scratches: $\iota \chi \chi \chi \iota \rightarrow \text{palindrome}$.

B: Plain.

A praxis known from a papyrus (PGM LXI 1-38) specifies that love charms had to be incised with the image of Horus on a lotus flower and the magical name Abraxas. Pieces with the Horus-scheme used as love charms: CBd-533, CBd-534.
